- Search metadata only?

- Search the full text?
- Read a transcription?
- Perform complex searches?

A continuum of costs

less expensive 

Desired product	Type of digitisation
Metadata and page images	Scanning
Full-text search (but still showing users the page images)	OCR
Full-text search with words highlighted on page images	OCR with coordinates
Transcription of the text	Corrected OCR or keyboarding, plus basic structural markup
Ability to do complex searching	Corrected OCR or keyboarding, plus deep encoding
