What is the Opioid Industry Documents Archive?





The Opioid Industry Documents Archive is a groundbreaking digital archive of documents arising from the opioid industry that advances understanding of the **root causes** of the **opioid epidemic** and helps address **corporate behavior** that is **harmful** to **public health**.







The Opioid Industry Documents Archive...

Consolidates publicly available information into an easily accessible digital archive for use by researchers, journalists, policy-makers, community members, and other stakeholders



- Aids in the search, retrieval and analysis of documents arising from opioid litigation including:
 - Court and litigation documents (expert depositions, complaints and amendments, internal company communications)
 - Documents from federal, state and local government agencies
 - Testimony from advocacy organizations (accounts of people with lived experience, addiction, and impact of the epidemic)
- Offers reference and technical assistance to those wishing to use materials
- Serves as a repository for new information from future cases
- Provides evidence to support changes in policy and practice





UCSF Tobacco Archives Serves as a Model



UCSF Truth Tobacco Industry Documents

1998 Master Settlement Agreement required millions of documents from tobacco companies about their advertising, manufacturing, marketing, scientific research, and political activities be made public



UCSF Archives & Special Collections contain:

Truth Tobacco Industry Documents

- 15+ million internal tobacco company documents
- Litigation documents
- Tobacco industry research studies

Tobacco Control Archives (TCA)

- Papers of government agencies and advocacy groups
- Video library including anti-smoking public service announcements, news programs, and documentaries







Impact of the Tobacco Industry Documents

- **Exposed inner-workings** of tobacco companies and their knowledge of the addictiveness of their products
- Over 1000 publications based on the documents including scientific manuscripts, book chapters, blog posts, newspaper articles and other reports
- Changed social norms regarding the importance of public access to information
- Helped influence policy decisions regarding internal company practices and marketing of tobacco

Family Smoking Prevention and Tobacco Control Act (2009) gives FDA authority to take action to protect public health regarding tobacco production, sales and use

World Health Organization's Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC) is an evidence-based treaty developed in response to the globalization of the tobacco epidemic



OIDA Accomplishments to Date

WASHINGTON POST OPIOID COLLECTION 55 Documents

Overview and Background

This collection contains exhibits entered by the defendants in the Ohio opioid multi-district litigation (MDL 2804) which were unsealed after a legal challenge by The Washington Post and the owner of the Charleston Gazette-Mail (HD Media) in West Virginia. The Ohio 6th Circuit Court of Appeals <u>ruled in June 2019</u> that certain court filings, along with the DEA's ARCOS (Automation of Reports and Consolidated Orders System) database, should be unsealed. The documents were posted online by The Washington Post on September 13, 2019.

Documents

The documents reveal detailed communications, strategies and reports by drug distributors to evade suspicious order monitoring compliance procedures in order to increase sales and profits from addictive drugs. Exhibits include: transcripts of depositions by Mallinckrodt executives (including Karen Harper, Director of Controlled Substance Compliance, and Victor Borelli, Director of National Accounts - Retail); emails, memos and presentation slides regarding suspicious order monitoring, sales increases, order handling and exceptions at McKesson, Cardinal Health and Walgreens; briefing and presentation on compliance by DEA to Actavis; and emails between Purdue Pharma and Cardinal Health regarding DEA enforcement.

Opioid Industry Documents Archive team members have not performed or commissioned any redactions on these documents.

KHN OXYCONTIN COLLECTION 9 Documents

Background

This collection contains Purdue Pharma internal budget documents for their opioid painkiller OxyContin from 1996 to 2002. These files were collected from the Florida Attorney General's office after the South Florida Sun-Sentinel and Orlando Sentinel won a lawsuit seeking to make them public. The documents were contributed by Kaiser Health News in 2019. The Opioid Industry Documents Archive (OIDA) received documents with redactions and highlighting; no further modifications were performed or commissioned by OIDA team members.



With two weeks to go in the year, Alec Burlakoff dashed off an urgent email to sales representative Daniel Tondre.

Tondre was assigned to a pain specialist in Sarasota, Florida, who was one of the most prolific prescribers of the potent fentanyl spray called Subsys. And Insys Therapeutics sales executive Burlakoff wanted the doctor, Steven Chun, to prescribe more of the addictive and potentially deadly drug to meet his company's goal.

"My best chance of hitting this is for Dr. Chun to turn it on this week," Burlakoff wrote to Tondre in the December 2012 message. "He is my ace in the whole (sic). Ask him NOT to hold back, I need a big bump this week."






